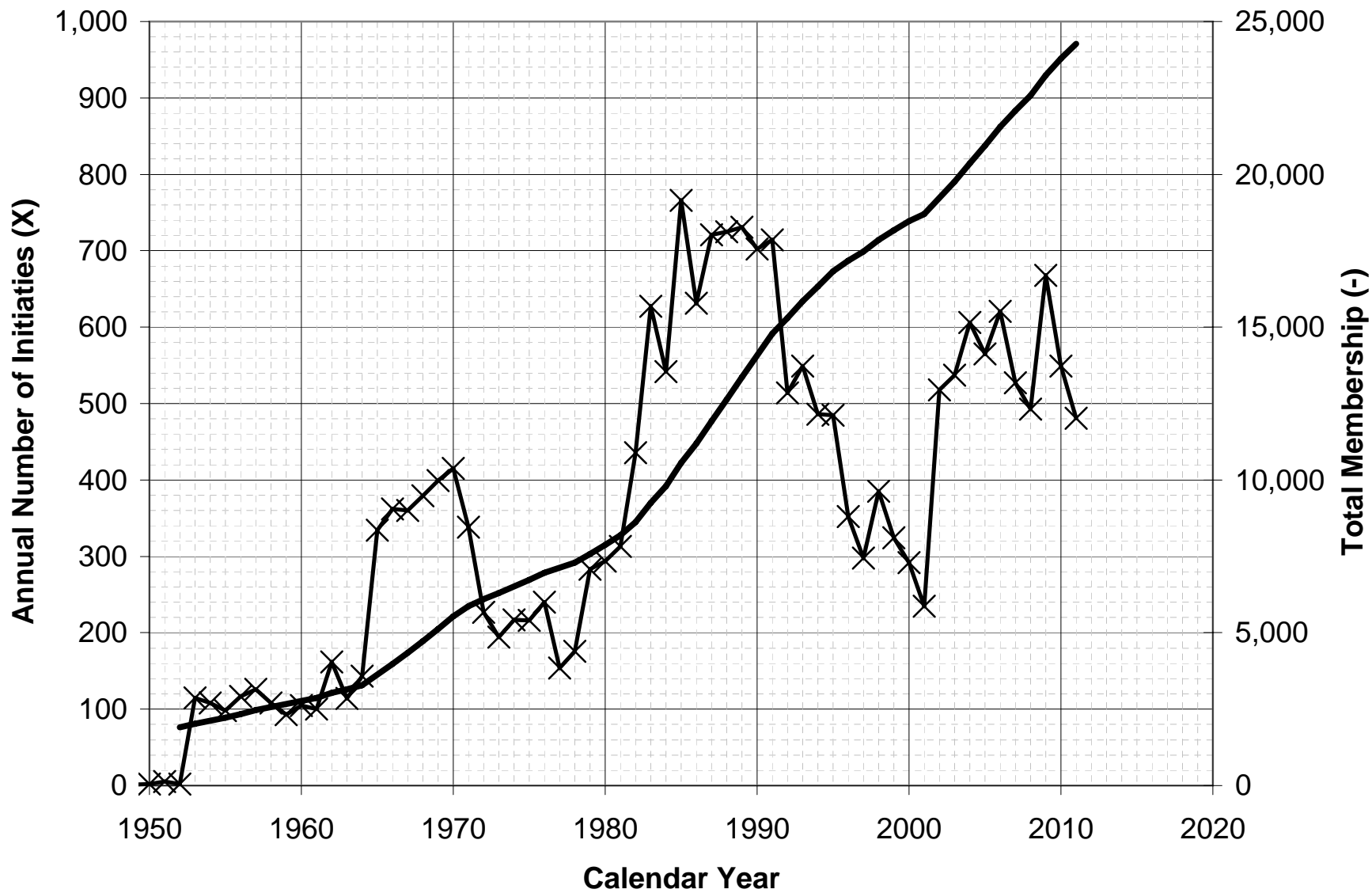


Sigma Gamma Tau Triennial Convention Minutes

8 January 2012 (Sunday before 50th AIAA Aerospace Sciences Meeting) at Gaylord OpryLand Hotel, Nashville, TN

1. Opening remarks and welcome by Dr. Roy Myose, Immediate Past President of Sigma Gamma Tau

3. Minutes from the 2009 Convention were approved with the correction that the financial report given during the January 2009 Convention was an estimate for the July 2006 through June 2009 time period. The actual account balance in July 2009 was \$6k up compared to July 2006.
4. Membership, regional composition, and potential new chapters
 - a) About 22,000 members plus another ~1900 from the parent societies which merged to form Sigma Gamma Tau
Info for 2011 in chart and table [pages 3-4] does not reflect actual numbers since chapters lag in reporting initiations
 - b) New chapter since 2009 Convention: Florida Institute of Technology (chapter installed on 29 April 2011)
 - c) Regional composition list [page 5] includes potential new chapters (which do not list year of most recent initiation)
5. Annual undergraduate award program [pages 6-7] typically involves about 20 nominees every year out of ~40 active chapters. There was a suggestion that Department Chairs be informed when the application / nomination period opens up in order to encourage an increase in the number of nominations. There was also a suggestion to provide travel funds for the National winner to travel to & be recognized at the AIAA Aerospace Sciences Meeting. (However, there was no motion or vote for this suggestion.) A discussion about the award judging process followed. The current process involves three judges; typically one judge is from academia (usually an emeritus faculty), one from industry, and one person with government ties. There are an odd number of judges in order to ensure that there are no ties in the results. The winner is typically an outstanding, well-rounded individual rather than a person with the highest GPA - extra curricular activities, work/research experience, and the essay about long-term goals are very important factors.
6. IRS tax exempt status: National "lost" its tax exempt status because contact information for the society was not filed as required [via IRS form 990-N (e-Postcard)], due to a confusion between the federal ID number for the subsidiary Wichita State chapter and National's federal ID number. Reinstatement of tax exempt status was sought by filing IRS form 1023 which involved significant man hours (determining the filing requirements, collecting and organizing the required financial information). The form was filed in September 2011 and the IRS should be ruling on our case very soon. This particular process will provide tax exemption for the parent organization (National SGT) with backdating so that there is no gap in tax exemption. It should be noted that chapters which had properly filed [via IRS form 990-N (e-Postcard)] have never lost their tax exemption. The next step will be to seek Group exemption for the subsidiary (local) chapters.
7. Financial report [pages 8-10]
 - a) Annual outlay overview: ~\$4,500 for undergrad awards plus \$2,750 for secretary pay = ~\$7,250 per year
2012 Convention cost: ~\$17k for 8 faculty & 6 students (1 more person + cost up on airfare, hotel, & venue)
In comparison, 2009 was ~\$11k for 17 delegates and 2006 was ~\$11k for 19 delegates
Average annual outlay: $(\$7,250 \times 3 + \$17,000) / 3 =$ equivalent to ~\$13k per year for this 3-year cycle
 - b) Undergraduate award program cost detail: ~\$4,500 per year (up from ~\$3,000 per year in previous 3-year cycle)
Award checks (\$1,000+\$250x8), plaques (\$1,000), stoles (\$25x~20), and mailing cost (~\$50)
Previous cycle: checks (\$400+\$200x7), plaques (\$900), & stoles or rebates to chapters => total ~\$3,000
 - c) Certificate: cost to make "blank" certificate is \$4 each (in lots of 1000) and calligrapher charges \$3.50 each
(When polled, general consensus was that hand calligraphy is preferred over computerized printing of certificates.)
Dues of \$25 less \$7.50 certificate cost = \$17.50 x ~600 initiates per year* = \$10½k income per year
*(Year, # initiates): (2009, 668), (2010, 549), (2011, 481 + additional 50) => average of ~600 per year
 - d) Stoles: charge \$35 while our cost is \$28 each (when ordered in large numbers) plus ~\$7 for mailing up to 5 stoles
SGT makes roughly \$5 per stole while selling 150-200 stoles => roughly \$1,000 income per year
 - e) Small tie-tac: \$20 each (costs \$18), last ordered 8/09, likely to cost substantially more due to silver price increase
Key: \$15 each (costs \$11, but heavy so shipping is expensive), last ordered 7/10, likely to cost somewhat more
Large size pin & pendant (47 & 6) still in stock, but will not be replaced when remaining stock is exhausted
 - f) Some chapters will need new Undergraduate Award plaque holders, each costing ~\$300 each
Affirmative vote in 2006 convention, National has paid for two plaques (Notre Dame in 2010 & KU in 2011)

- g) New chapter installation costs ~\$700-\$850 (Florida Tech travel cost was \$615 & plaque + roll book was \$74)
- h) Estimate about even or up \$2k in terms of assets (cash + merchandise value in stock) compared to 3-years ago
 ~\$13k outlay per year versus income of \$10½k from dues & ~\$1k from stoles plus some CD interest
 Very little CD interest income now (\$1,440 in 2007, \$1,310 in 2008, \$450 in 2009, \$150 in 2010)
 Cash on hand \$26½k (less ~\$17k for Convention which means balance of ~\$9½k) plus ~\$38k in CD's
 Constitution requires that (at least) \$15k be kept in safe securities such as bank CD's.
- i) Based on an estimate of being about even on the finances compared to three years ago, the general view was to continue with the current dues and merchandise pricing (roughly \$5 "profit" from stoles and break-even on jewelry).
8. Vote on Secretary-Treasurer honorarium of \$2,750 per year (same as previous 3 years) was approved unanimously.
9. Vote on reimbursing travel and hotel plus per diem of \$100 to cover meals was approved unanimously.
10. Lunch guest - Klaus Dannenberg, AIAA Deputy Executive Director, was invited to discuss the possibility of partnering with AIAA on projects. He spoke about the possibility of considering a merger of SGT into AIAA. An example of Aerospace Engineering Department Chairs' group meeting under the umbrella of the AIAA was mentioned. On the positive side, there could be significantly more publicity / recognition for the SGT Undergraduate Award winners. In terms of concerns, SGT delegates raised the possibility that membership dues probably would go up, that the SGT undergraduate award process could be overridden by AIAA procedures, and that SGT Convention delegates may have to pay AIAA conference registration fee in order to attend their own Convention. The general consensus was not very positive about a merger with (or SGT being acquired by) AIAA unless there are significant financial problems that occur within SGT.
11. A recommendation was made by the Executive Council to name the Great Lakes Regional Undergraduate Award in honor of Dr. Harry Hilton for his service as National Secretary for 11 years and Regional Coordinator since SGT formed in 1953. Motion was formally made by Dr. Valasek (who suggested this when he was SGT President) and seconded by Dr. Holt. Motion was approved unanimously.
12. The fact that SGT has allowed special membership posthumously was mentioned. Dr. Mark Bower, Department Chair at U. Alabama Huntsville, was approved for special membership, but passed away before the new chapter installation ceremony - he was the first individual known to have been awarded a posthumous special membership. Liviu Librescu, a well-known aerospace researcher and Professor at Virginia Tech who helped saved many students' lives in his classroom, was approved for special membership posthumously after the Virginia Tech incident. A suggestion was made that chapters be informed that posthumous special membership is possible.
13. Update from Boston University (BU) about their AE accreditation in the future (presented by Dr. Holt): There has been a merger between ME, AE, and Manufacturing Engineering at BU. The last group of "pure" AE majors will graduate this year. Thus, BU has moved away from three degree programs (all of which were ABET accredited), to a single ABET accredited degree program in ME, but with several concentration fields. It is expected that the number of initiates from the BU chapter (who are in the AE concentration) will subside. There was a discussion about whether BU should be allowed to continue initiating new members and to nominate an individual for the annual undergraduate awards. Dr. Valasek pointed out that our constitution does not require any action on this, since the constitution talks only about ABET accreditation when a new chapter is being started. Dr. Hilton raised a motion to continue the status quo for now and to look at the issue again in the 2015 Convention. The motion passed, with all in favor.
14. Highlights of comments from chapters represented at the Convention about their activities:
- a) Wichita State has a display board with the names of the SGT members by initiation class [pages 11-12]. The board serves to advertise SGT and provides a sense of pride to alumni who are "immortalized" on the board. The cost of a blank board (a kitchen tabletop) was ~\$400. The large SGT key was purchased from the Purdue University chapter which made the mold for it in the 1980's. Unfortunately, the mold is lost so large keys are no longer available.
- b) Texas A&M SGT provides tutoring on certain days of the week and also conducts reviews before exams. About 20-30 people attend each time. These SGT activities have helped with the retention of sophomores into the junior year. SGT also goes to high schools and encourages interest in AE. SGT members came up with point system in order to encourage service to SGT. Only those who have earned service points are allowed to purchase a graduation stole.
- c) Mississippi State has an annual banquet, recently had a 40th anniversary cake. Identifying potential nominees early on and advertising at the AIAA meetings helps. Holds combined service activity together with the AIAA student section.
- d) University of Maryland just got back to being an active SGT chapter. The SGT members go to AIAA meetings and talk about SGT in order to raise awareness.
- e) University of Illinois has an initiation banquet which is subsidized by the Department. SGT also organizes talks by faculty members to speak about their research in order to encourage student interest for the graduate program.
- f) Embry-Riddle at Prescott has two initiations a year, organizes tutoring, trail work for service, and fund raisers like selling T-shirts.
- g) Central Florida has faculty guest speaker on research at SGT meeting
- h) Clarkson has initiation dinner/social, tour of aerospace museum in Ottawa, and resume building seminar with a sponsor
- i) Cal Poly San Luis Obispo has initiation banquet, PR to freshman through a beach party, and would like to organize a tour to NASA.
- j) Boston University: seniors are typically invited to social at Dr. Holt's house. Initiation in spring held on mountain top. List of officers posted in hallway.
15. The Constitution and Initiation Ritual were reviewed. One suggested clarification in the Constitution was Art III Sect 3d - ~~existing~~ **active** chapters to be consistent (e.g., Art IX). For the Initiation Ritual, the VP's part should state ~~aeronautical~~ **aerospace** engineering.
16. There was a discussion about allowing accredited AE programs overseas to form chapters. A comment was made that a program under a "memorandum of understanding" is not necessarily an ABET equivalent program so only those under the ABET Washington Accord should be considered. There was also a comment that the Sigma Gamma Tau name currently has a subtitle of "National" Honor Society in Aerospace Engineering. A vote for the consensus "feeling" of the Convention delegates was 7 in favor, 3 neutral, and 3 against. A suggestion was made that a three-fourths positive vote by active chapters should be required and not to consider a non-vote to be a positive vote in the case of considering a new international chapter. Additional discussions with Tau Beta Pi (which may also consider international chapters) was also recommended.

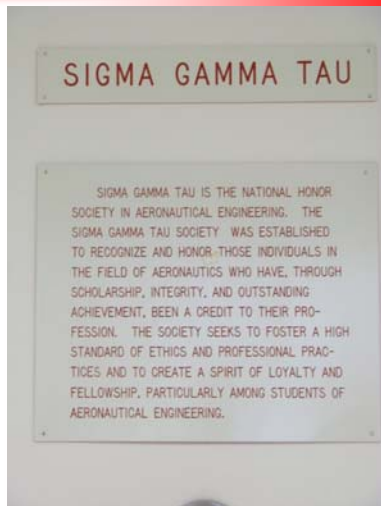
